

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQ)

Here are some common questions every adult/parent has about camp. Each section in this booklet has a section specific to that type of camp, for further reference:

### What are the differences between Family Camp, Day Camp, and Resident Camp?

Each style of camping has something to offer. All of our Council camps provide activities and advancement opportunities, but in a variety of settings lasting between one- and three-days. Here is a simple comparison chart:

### Do all camps include an overnight?

No. While Family and Resident Camps offer a night (or two) of tent camping, DAY CAMPS do not. Standard Day Camps happen between 8 am and 4 pm, three to five days a week. Twilight Camps are an evening version, lasting from about 4 pm to 8 pm. (*Specific times vary by Day Camp.*)

### What do Scouts do at camp?

A lot! All camps offer opportunities for shooting sports, nature study, hiking, and hands-on activities in the form of games and crafts. Family Camps and Resident Camps take advantage of the existing BSA Camp facility, and offer climbing, swimming, and boating.

All of our camps also have an annual theme, which helps keep programming fresh and new. This year's theme is "BugBusters," where campers will learn all about insects and spiders. BugBusters will study the big and small bugs and their mostly unseen world; BugBusters don't HURT bugs, they help BUST rumors and misunderstandings about them. Cubs who are BugBusters say, "WE AIN'T AFRAID OF NO BUG!"

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (cont.)

### **Will my Scout complete advancement at camp?**

Yes. Most camps include a few opportunities for Cub Scouts and Webelos to complete rank requirements. While Resident Camp tends to have more of a focus on this, Day Camps and Family Camps focus less on advancement. Regardless of the type of camp, your Scout will complete requirements. It is sometimes up to the leader/parent to observe and work with your Cub Scout or Webelos to track that advancement, as not all completed requirements will be specifically part of the program. (For instance, you may do a self-guided hike while at Resident Camp that fulfills a requirements, but will not be listed on the “Advancement Report” you get when you leave.)

### **Do we have to bring our own food?**

Sometimes. Family Camps and Resident Camps provide a full-service meal plan, feeding you all your meals throughout your stay; Day Camps usually do not and require campers to bring a bag lunch. ### **Is camp safe?**

Yes, we do everything we can to make camp safe and fun. Shooting sports and climbing staff are required to have special safety training and equipment is inspected before every use. A medic is onsite at all camps. Overnight camps have safety procedures and shelters in case of weather. All staff and volunteers are required to take Youth Protection training to provide a safe environment. We do our best to keep kids safe at camp.

# FAMILY WEEKENDS

## Camp for the WHOLE FAMILY!

Cub Scouts enjoy sharing their camping experience with everyone in the family; that's possible with our Cub Family Weekends!

Programs for Family Weekends are designed to be appropriate for Scouts and non-Scouts alike. Siblings as young as 3 years of age can participate in most of the fun, and non-Scout brothers and sisters who are at least 5 years old can participate in EVERYTHING!

Cub Family Weekends are held two times in May, and once in October. Each weekend takes advantage of one of our beautiful Council-owned camp properties, so each weekend has a slightly different set of offerings. All weekends include shooting programs, nature study, building projects, and fishing. Campers are also treated to 4 meals provided by certified chefs.

Cub Family Weekends are the perfect introduction to camping for your newest Scout or Scout-to-be, and is certainly fun for the whole family.

### IMPORTANT:

Remember, Cub Family Weekends include an OVERNIGHT camping element. Campers should bring appropriate equipment, including a tent, sleeping bag, and other "comfort" items for overnight camping. Bathrooms and showers are available at both camps. For a complete list of "what to bring," see page 11.

Over 30 years ago, LSSR hosted small gatherings of international Scouts which they called Amikaros; we continue this tradition today with our growing Cub Resident Camp program, and are excited to share an exciting summer with you and your Cub Scouts in 2017 under this historic name!

Bring your den, pack, or just your Scout to Little Sioux Scout Ranch for our 2017 "BUGBUSTERS" Resident Camp program. Our Cub and Webelos activity curriculum uses the latest updated Cub requirements, helping to keep parents and leaders ahead of the curve.

Scouts attending Resident Camp will receive a **FREE t-shirt and patch**, provided they indicate their shirt size on their registration and they are paid in full 3 weeks prior to their session start. Adults will receive a camp patch, and can purchase a t-shirt for \$8 online before camp or \$10 at camp.

## CAMPERSHIPS:

We do not want any Scout to miss camp due to financial need. Funds are available to assist families; all campership information is kept confidential. Campership applications are available online and **MUST** be received in the Durham Scout Center on or before April 3, 2017 for consideration.

# HOW TO REGISTER

Signing up for camp is easy. Follow these simple steps:

## **Pick a Session:**

Work with your Den/Pack to decide on a session to attend as a group. If the Den or Pack choose a session that does not work for your schedule, then sign up you and your Scout to attend on your own (you will make new friends at camp!) Many Packs choose 2-3 sessions to promote, so that Dens or small groups of Scouts can attend together. Dens and Packs also get ONE FREE ADULT registration for every 8 youth signed up...so it literally PAYS to register as a group!

## **Visit [www.GoCubCamping.org](http://www.GoCubCamping.org) and click “Resident Camp”:**

Choose “Register Now” from the navigation buttons, and follow the online steps. If signing up as a Den or Pack, it is best to have a Pack Camp Coordinator do the registration for everyone, so that Camp Staff have a single point of contact to share updates leading up to camp. Signing up everyone in the Den or Pack at once is also the only way to get the free leader discount mentioned above. There will be a “Parent Portal” link offered to all parents, so that you can access your Scout’s registration directly.

## **Sign Up for Activities starting March 18:**

While you can sign up for your Session of Resident Camp anytime, activity selection will not be activated on the system until after our Parent/Leader Meeting on March 18 (see page 10). After that meeting, the complete “Program Guide” and full instructions on signing Scouts up for activities will be posted on [www.GoCubCamping.org](http://www.GoCubCamping.org). You will choose up to 6 specific activities for your Scout to participate in, ranging from swimming and shooting activities to nature hikes and science investigations. You will also have the option to select advancement requirements you want to complete at camp. This is an important step in the registration process.

## **Complete payment:**

When you register, you will have the option to pay the full amount at that time, or wait and pay later. Payment can be completed by Credit Card and eCheck online, or by using credit, check, cash, or Unit Account at the Scout Office. Dens and Packs signing up their whole group may promote the use of the “Parent Portal” and allow each family to pay separately. All Payments MUST be made before May 1 for June Sessions (or June 1 for July Sessions) to qualify for discounted rates.

## **Sell Camp Cards:**

Cub Scouts and Webelos who sell 80 or more Camp Cards this spring will get a FREE TICKET to camp! Qualifying Scouts will have their fees reimbursed when the Camp Card sale is completed. Details are available at [www.mac-bsa.org](http://www.mac-bsa.org) under “Unit Fundraising.”

## PARENT'S GUIDE TO CUB RESIDENT CAMP

Our Cub Scout Campers are our the most important people at camp. and you, their parent, are right behind them. We want to make sure you and your Scout have a fun, safe, and comfortable experience at camp. We also want to make sure that getting prepared for camp is as clear and easy as possible. The next few pages should help you get started; more detailed information is available at [www.GoCubCamping.org](http://www.GoCubCamping.org), under “Resident Camp.”

### PREPARING FOR CAMP

Getting ready for camp isn't too complicated, but there are a couple important things to remember:

#### **Attend the Parent/Leader Meeting on March 18**

*Little Sioux Scout Ranch; 10 am to 3 pm; FREE*

This meeting is your chance (as parent or leader) to get more details about camp, meet some of the key staff, and get a sneak peek at all of the great activities we will be offering. Includes morning information session, lunch, then optional camp tours and activity sample for youth and adults. Register for this meeting at <https://scoutingevent.com/?LSSRprecamp>

#### **Medical Forms**

Every youth and adult who attends ANY Cub Scout Camp or activity MUST have a completed Medical Form, parts A and B. The form is filled out entirely by the parent, and simply reveals health history and any allergies and medications. It is turned in at check in, and kept secure by camp medical staff. This form and instructions are available at [www.GoCubCamping.org](http://www.GoCubCamping.org) under “Additional Resources.” (Remember to print one for each youth AND adult.)

#### **Swim Checks**

The Lakefront at Little Sioux is amazing: a 16-acre lake with fishing, boating, and swimming areas. In order for campers to take part in swimming and boating activities, they need to take a BSA Swimmer Test. Using a boat requires a “Swimmer” to be in the boat with any “Beginners” or “Non-swimmers.” You may also hear these levels referred to as “Blue,” “Red,” and “White.” Scouts and adults should plan on taking a swim test when you arrive at camp, or pre-qualify at a pool with a Red Cross Certified Lifeguard.

## ACTIVITIES

Resident Camp offers a wide-range of activities for Cub Scouts and Webelos! The complete list of programs will be published in March, but here is a basic list of activities and programs you can expect to find at camp:

### Climbing:

Little Sioux Scout Ranch features an innovative, 3-wall climbing area, offering a level of challenge appropriate for each age group in Cub Scouting. We also have an obstacle course, slack line, and other fun “ropes” activities to build camper teamwork and confidence.



### Lakefront (Aquatics):

Swimming, boating, and fishing are offered at our 16-acre lake at LSSR. Scouts who want to work to complete their advancement requirements in this area will have that opportunity...or they can just have fun and cool off at the lake!

### Nature/Outdoors:

Our Nature programs will teach Scouts about the amazing world around them. Nature programs don't spend a lot of time in a classroom; instead, these activities take to the trail for an engaging (educational) hike!



### Shooting Sports:

Under the supervision of certified rangemasters, campers can safely shoot archery, BB guns, and wrist rockets. Previous years' programs have also included NERF shooting, giant slingshots, and pellet rifles for Webelos.

### STEM (Science, Tech, Engineering, Math):

Campers taking part in a STEM program will learn about simple machines, microscopic animals, robots, chemical reactions, and more. Our STEM programs offer a mix of classroom instruction and hands-on experiences. All of them are a blast!



## OTHER PROGRAMS

### Advancement:

Each of the program areas listed above will offer a few activities focused on helping your Scout advance. The list of specific achievements being focused on will be released with our complete Program Guide in March.

### Evening Programs:

Friday and Saturday night will feature a few special activities for everyone. Friday's campfire is performed by our Camp Staff and is sure to entertain; Saturday's campfire is for our campers to show their stuff on stage! Our Night Hike, Flag Retirement, and Movie Night are highlights for night owls trying to get the most out of their camp experience.

### Scouts' Own Service:

On Saturday after dinner, campers gather at the Chapel for a non-denominational service. Scouts in uniform may be asked to assist in this simple worship service.

# District DAY CAMPS

## Experience camp in your own backyard!

The Mid-America Council offers several types of “Day Camp” opportunities, ranging from 3-day and 5-day day camps, to 5-day “twilight” camps that are held in the evening. These camps are centrally located within each of our District service areas. Campers attend each day to build upon the experiences and skills they learned the day before! It’s for Tiger Cubs, Cub Scouts, and Webelos. Campers do not stay overnight.

Scouts attending Day Camp will receive a **FREE t-shirt and patch**, provided they indicate their shirt size on their registration and they are paid in full 3 weeks prior to their session start. Campers attending a 3-day or 5-day “Day” camp should plan on packing a lunch; some camps may provide a snack during their day or evening programming.
